




### Boy of the Deeps

"James, the son of a coal miner, goes with his father for the first time to work in the mines of near his home in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia." - from Follett



"Meggie Gwinn's father reminds her of the good things that have come from coal mining after she get upset thinking of the bad things about his job." - Pub.




### Town Is by the Sea



by Joyce Barkhouse, c2011 (IL: 3-6, RL: 4.4)




### MINRS (Book 1)


Life in a Mining Community




