

Once you reach the Learn71 homepage, select <u>LRC/Library Learning Commons</u> from the main menu.




This will bring you to the <u>Learning Resources Centre and Library Learning Commons</u> page, where you can find the link to the Research Databases.



Click on LRC/Library Learning Commons from the main menu.


Select Destiny Library Catalogue from the menu on the right.



This link opens the Destiny homepage.



Click on your school. In this example, I clicked on **Airport Elementary School**, and Airport's generic library page displays:



This is the version that anyone can access. For students to access all of our great resources, however, which are password protected, they need to log in. They do this by clicking on the

small **Log In** link in the blue horizontal bar in the upper right-hand corner.



The student logins are set up as username: their student number, and password. Intermediate students have created their own passwords, however primary grades use their initials plus the last four digits of their student number.

When they login, the full library home page appears:



Click on the Research Databases button.



Note that if you are ever asked for a login, then it is the same login used to log into your school library, i.e., for students it is Username: student number, Password: initials plus last four digits of student number.

Before clicking on the **Research Databases** button, it is important to know where to find the logins for them. While at school, the students do not need to log in, but they do when at home or somewhere other than school. The usernames and passwords to log in with can be found by clicking on the **Passwords** button on their library home page, just under the **Research Databases** button.



To see all the databases, including the films, scroll down. Be sure to explore the menu on the right-hand side of the screen, that has additional resources, such as a very valuable tip sheet called *Text to Speech for Databases*. It shows how to convert the text in the database selected, into speech, and enables students of all reading levels to access the content. The *Feature Film Resource Page* has important login information to view the films.
