

Secret of the Dance	Secret of the Dance by Andrea Spalding and Alfred Scow; illustrated by Darlene Gait (2007) (Indigenous) In 1935, a nine-year-old boy's family held a forbidden Potlatch in faraway Kingcome Inlet. Watl'kina slipped from his bed to bear witness. In the Big House masked figures danced by firelight to the beat of the drum. And there, he saw a figure he knew – his own father.

In an age when boys are expected to fit into a particular mold, this book celebrates all the wonderful ways to be a boy.
Julián Is a Mermaid by Jessica Love (2018)
While riding the subway home from the pool with his abuela one day, Julián notices three women spectacularly dressed up. When Julián gets home, daydreaming of the magic he's seen, all he can think about is dressing up just like the ladies in his own fabulous mermaid costume: a butter-yellow curtain for his tail, the fronds of a potted fern for his headdress. But what will Abuela think about the
