



Design For Change Four years ago a group of nine teachers from across School District 71 began a professional partnership based on a shared concern for student engagement. They started with the challenge of how to empower learners with a greater sense of meaning and purpose in school. They wondered, if by setting aside

time for inquiry, would this increase student engagement, better prepare students to be self-directed learners, and increase their personal and social responsibility? Early in their partnership, a teacher involved in the collaboration shared a link to the TED talk Kiran Bir Sethi teaches kids to take charge and encouraged the rest to view it. Kiran's words filled them with inspiration and the

The team embarked on an inquiry, encouraging their students to think deeply about real issues. They guided them with examples of young people being change makers in their own communities, both locally and globally, and then empowered their students to identify issues that they were concerned about, to imagine solutions, and to take action. Now, through the work of this team, our district is connected to Design for Change, the largest global movement designed to give children an opportunity to express their own ideas for a better world and put them into action.
