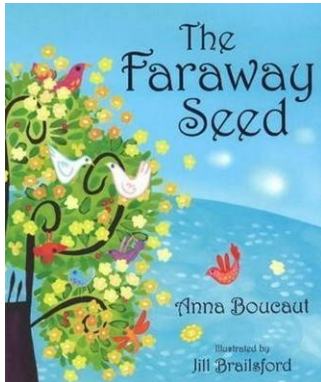


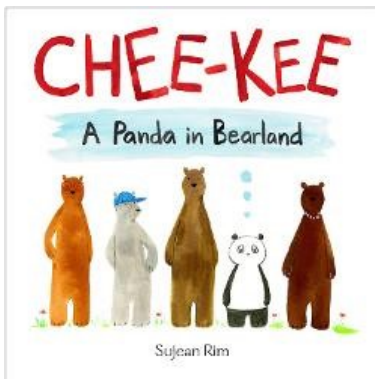

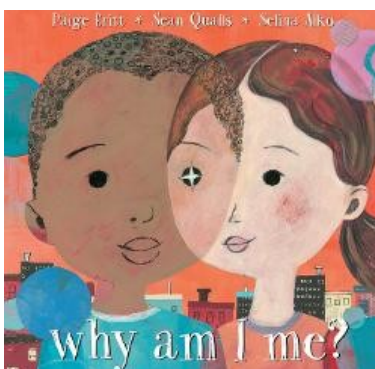
## **The Faraway Seed** by Anna Boucaut, c2009

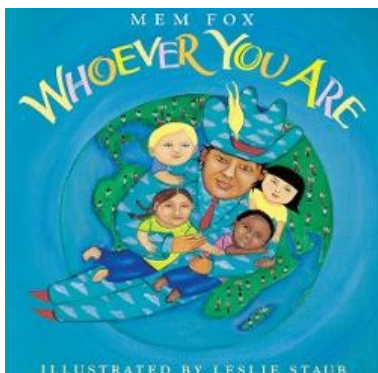
## **Chee-Kee A Panda in Bearland** by Sujean Rim, c2017 (IL: K-3)

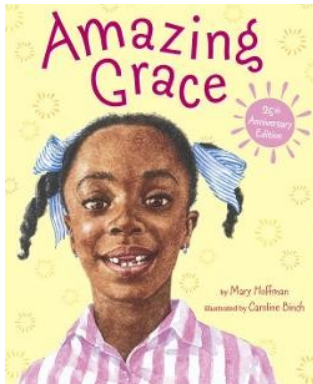
## **Every Little Letter**

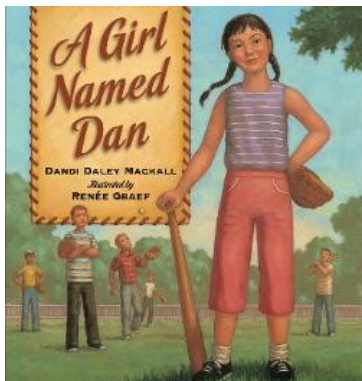

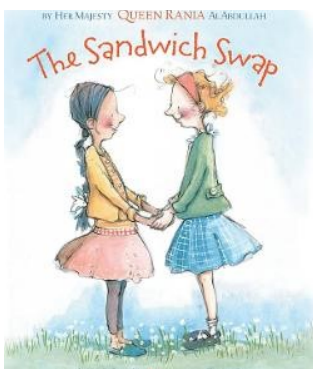

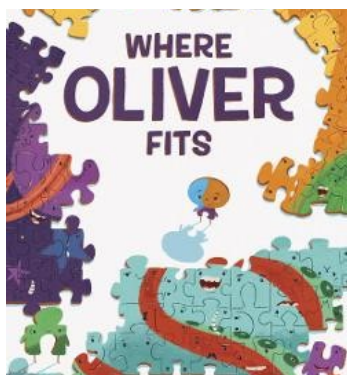

## **Where Oliver Fits**

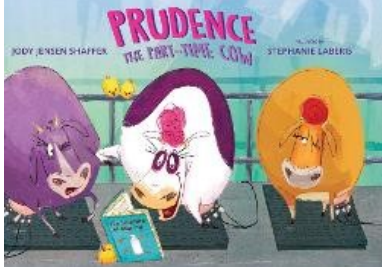
