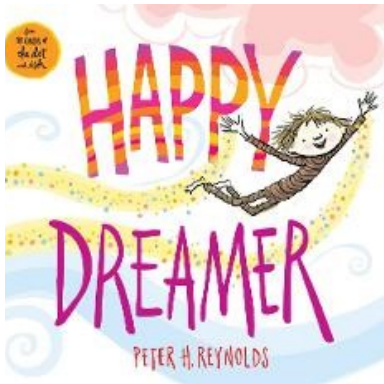

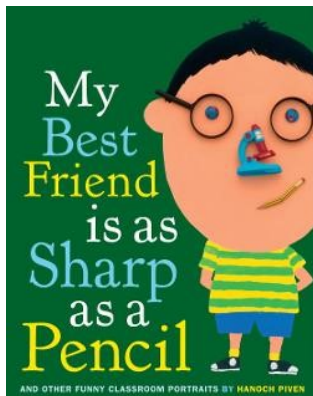


Things to Do

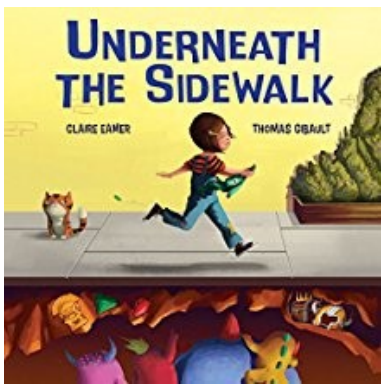

by Claire Eamer, c2017 (IL: K-3)

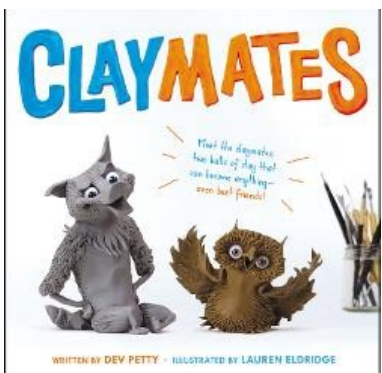

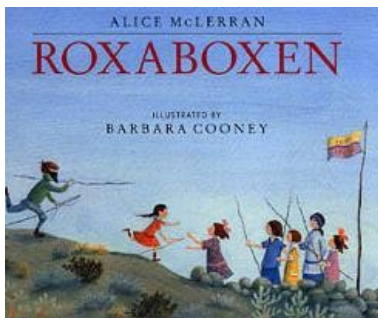

Skyfishing by Gideon Sterer, c2017 (IL: K-3, RL: 3.0)

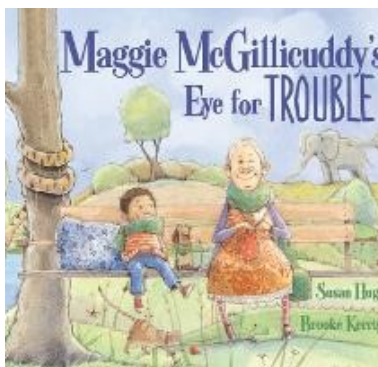

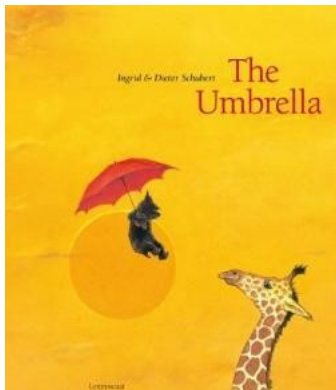

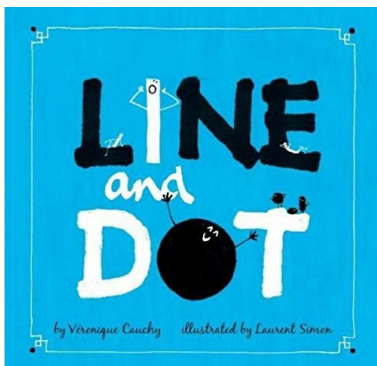
A River by Marc Martin, c2017 (IL: K-3, RL: 4.4)

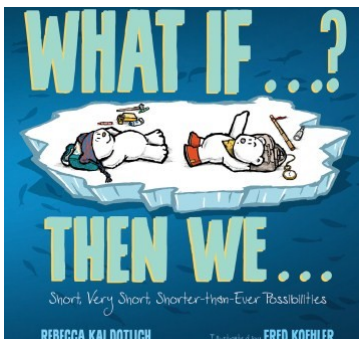
The Umbrella

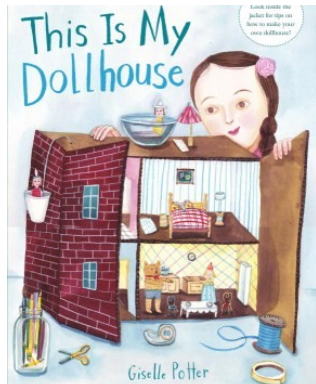


What If...? Then We...

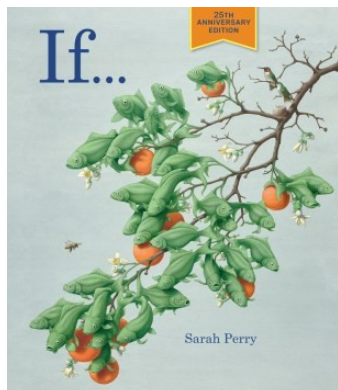

by Giselle Potter, c2016 (IL: K-3, K-2; RL: 3.4)

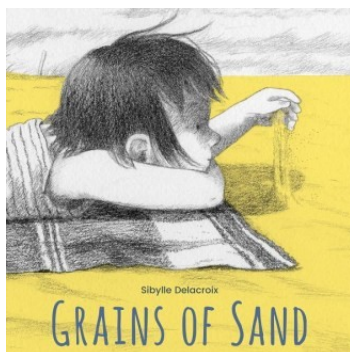

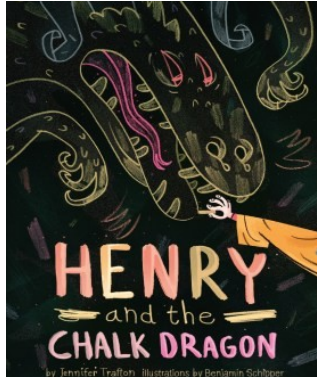
Grains of Sand
