S tory workshop is becoming a common way in our district for our early primary teachers to foster a community of storytellers and authors. We understand that everyone has stories in them memoir stories, exciting stories, make-believe stories, ho-hum stories and that sharing these helps us build connection with each other and builds our identities as authors.



What to do, when the mechanics of writing and reading are still challenging for many of our young learners?

This is the power of Story Workshop! Using loose parts, (pinecones, shells, buttons, bits of wood, and maybe some sparkly items) children use their

In our Changing Results for Young Children project we are using the Early Learning Framework from the Ministry of Education to inform our conversations and thinking about our wonder children. Consider this statement:

"Images of children and understandings about learning and education are not universal but vary in different histories and in response to people's experiences, beliefs and aspirations. ...With that in mind, educators need to challenge accepted mainstream knowledge to explore different understandings and world views." (p. 49 ELF)

How have your ideas of children and learning changed over the years?

These are the kinds of quotes that provoke good discussion in these sessions and are transforming the ways we listen and learn from children, parents and our colleagues.

For more information about any of these projects please contact: Jacquie Anderson Early Years Lead Teacher stories as a class, and then ask questions of the storyteller, we are acting as editors, so the author can make their story clearer and more interesting to the listeners.

In addition to these valuable opportunities for the development of oral language, story concepts and social competencies that Story Workshop provides, as children learn to attribute meaning to items *which are*

standing in for something else (using a rock for an owl, or a shell for a boat) they are building their capacity for symbolic representation, which lies at the very foundation of learning to read and write. It is in this way that c-a-t (for example), which looks nothing like a cat, comes in time to be fully understood as standing in for a real cat with all its attributes.





As children build this symbolic understanding of the world, letters and print become more meaningful to them.

Time after time, when story workshop is in action, we see children engaged and curious and attentive to each other. It is a powerful tool for establishing a community of authors as we launch into future forays learning to write our stories.
