## **Thinking Like Writers...**

**reating a community of writers** has been a rewarding undertaking in many of our kindergartens. Bookmaking and thinking like authors has provided a rich way for children to show what they know through pictures and words. Using favourite stories and

modelling from other authors, we explored how authors convey their ideas and how important pictures are to the book. This focus on pictures helps pave the way for children still uncertain in their writing skills to





engage as authors themselves. There is nothing more powerful than seeing your own writing "style" reflected in books read to the class. If you are a black and white illustrator, there are books like that! If you are a Spiderman fan, there are books like

that! If you are a scientist and interested in animals, bugs, tornados, seasons...there are books like that! If you like writing about your pets, there are books like that! If you like making speech bubbles, there are books like that! Mo Willems, Donald Crews, Tana Hoban, Cynthia Rylant, and others, all become author friends of the class, as children read these stories and see themselves and their own preferences reflected in them. In this way, stories become both a mirror and a window—children
