by Rebecca Kai Dotlich, c2015 (IL: K-3, RL: 0.7)

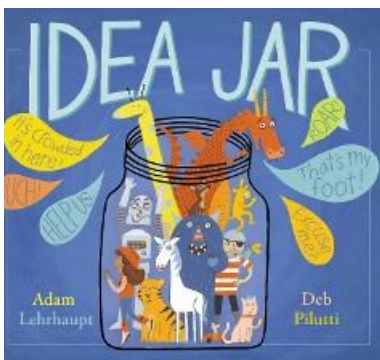

Help Find Frank

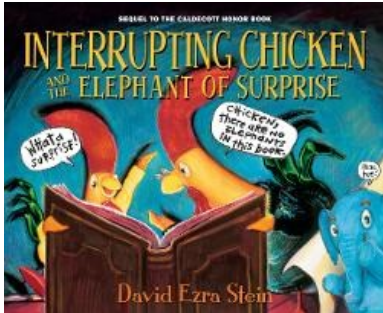

by Rebecca Van Slyke, c2017 (IL: K-3, RL: 3.6)

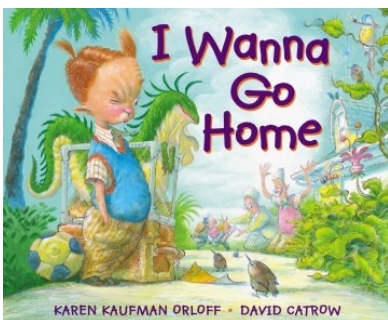

by Karen Kaufman Orloff, c2004 (IL: K-3, RL: 3.5)

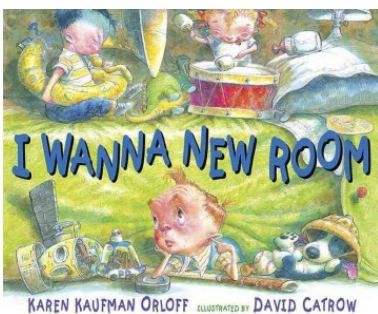
"Alex and his mother write notes back and forth in which Alex tries to persuade her to let him have a baby iguana for a pet." - Pub.

I Wanna New Room

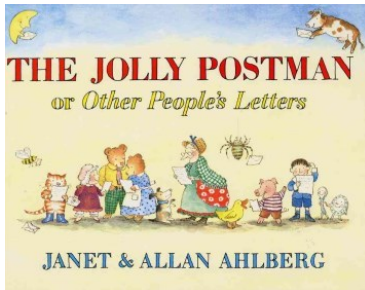

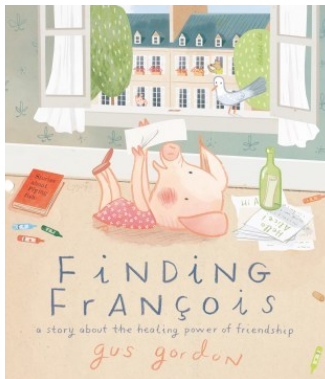


Write! Write! Write!

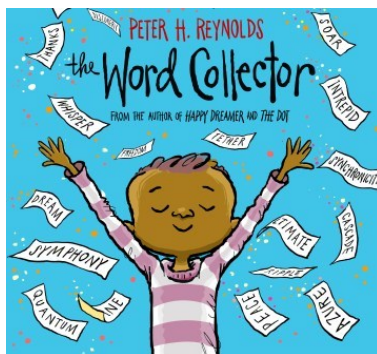

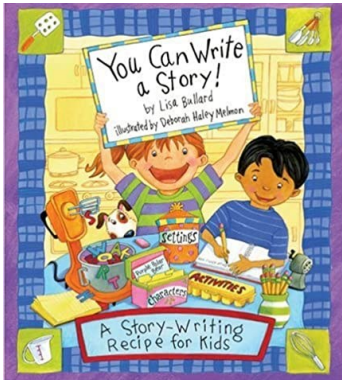
