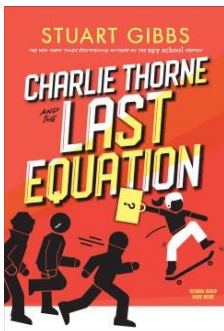


The Canyon's Edge

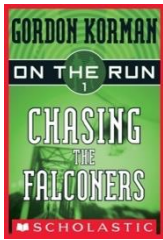

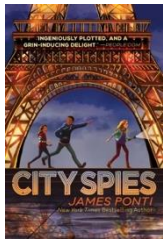

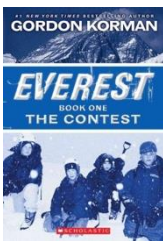
City Spies (*City Spies, Bk. 1*)

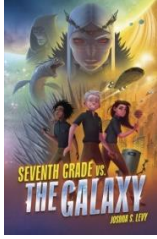

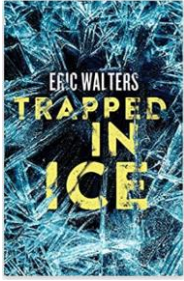
Stowaway (*Icarus Chronicles, Bk. 1*)

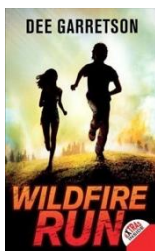

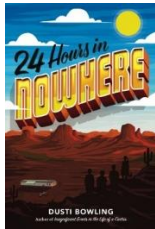
