

## Font choices

Some students can read print easier when there is increased spacing between the letters, characters and words. This spacing is called "kerning". Different fonts utilize different amounts of spacing. Also, some fonts use curly cues that can be confusing to discern. Other fonts use different angles to help separate the letters. Different font colour and background colour can also help make print easier to read. Below are good font options for clear, easy to read print.

Ask students what works best for them.

A a - This is Arial font style, 18-point size.

A a - This is Tahoma font style, 18-point size.

A a - This is Comic Sans style, 18-point size.

A a - This is Verdana font style, 18-point size.

A a - This is Century Gothic font style, 18-point size.

**A a - This is Century Gothic font style, 18-point size - bold.**

**A a - This is BC Sans Font, 18 - point size.**

**A a - This is Open Dyslexic Font, 18-point size.**
