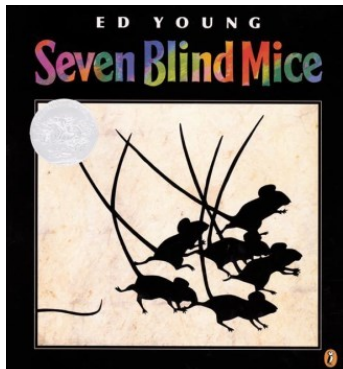

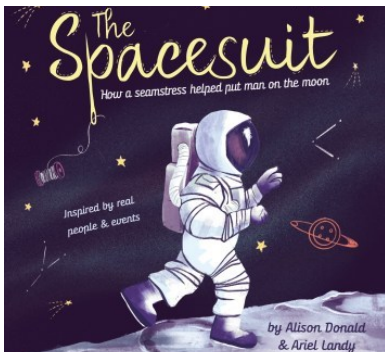


Seven Blind Mice

Theme: Together is Better, Different Perspectives

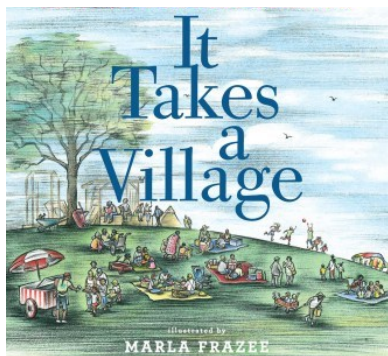

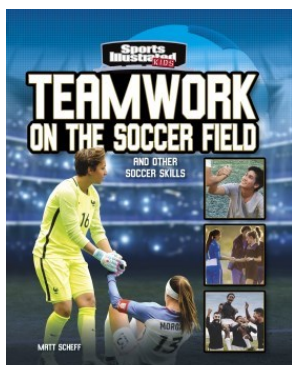
