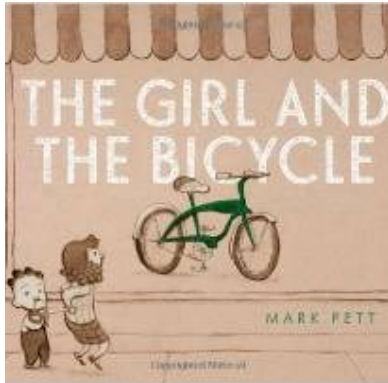


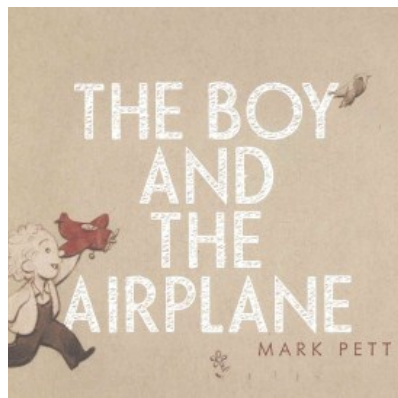

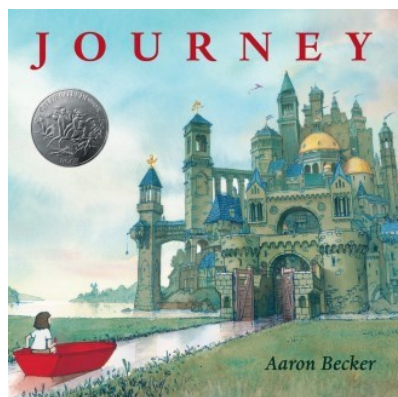
**The Girl and the Bicycle**

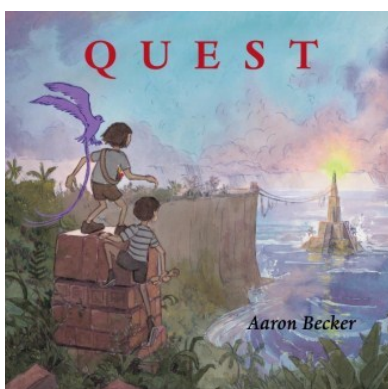
**The Boy and the Airplane**

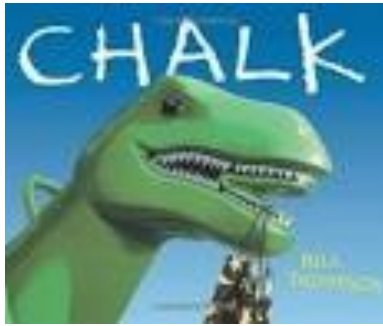


**Quest** by Aaron Becker, c2014 (IL: K-3)

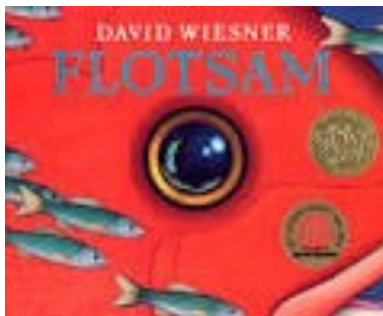

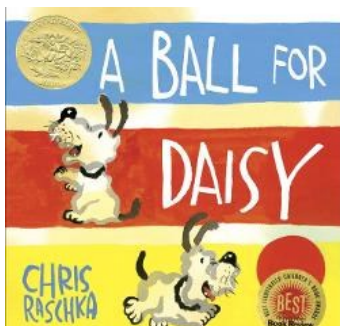
**Out of the Blue** by Alison Jay, c2014 (IL: K-3)

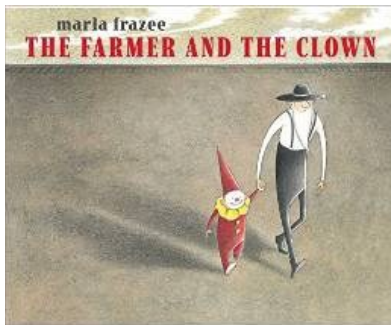

"A young girl watches as the activities across the street from her bus stop become a circus." - Follett



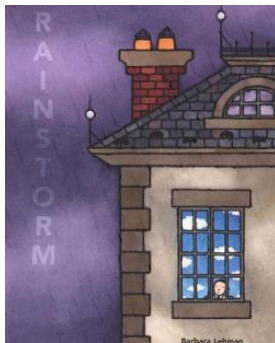
## **The Farmer and the Clown** by Marla Frazee, c2014 (IL: K-3)

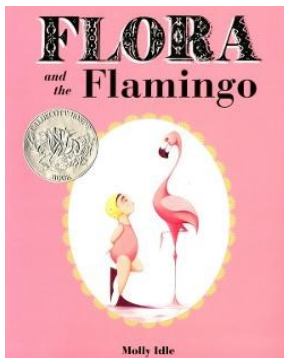

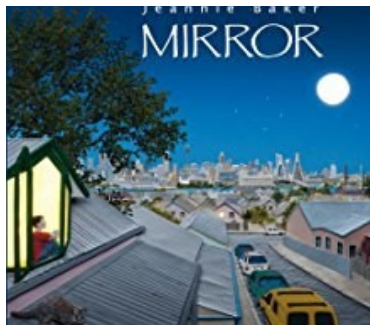


## Flora and the Flamingo

by Molly Schaar Idle, c2013 (IL: K-3)

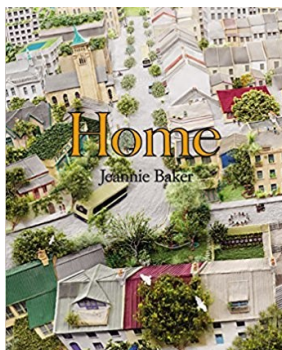

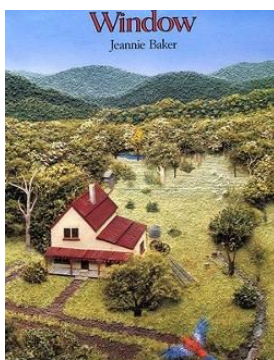
## Mirror by Jeannie Baker, c2010 (IL: K-3)

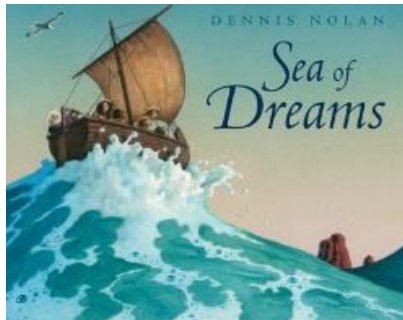

by Béatrice Rodriguez, c2010 (IL: K-3)

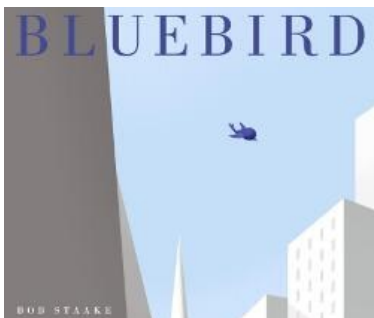

## Sea of Dreams

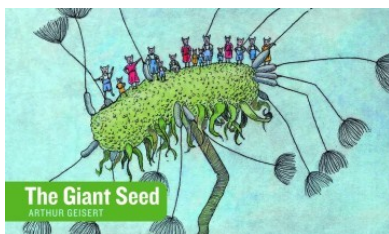

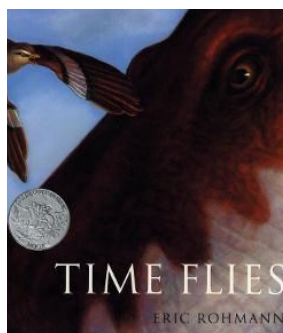
Bluebird by Bob Staake, c2013 (IL: K-3)

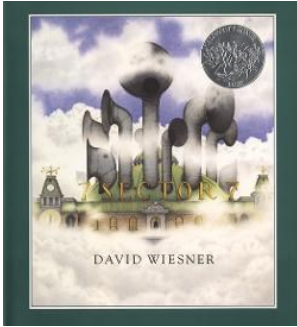

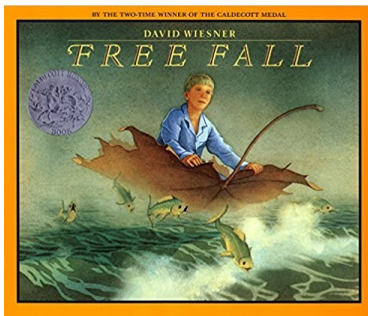

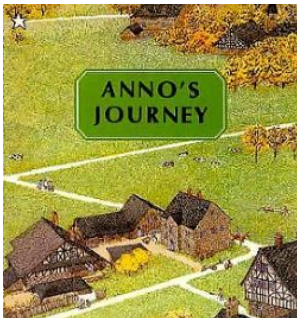
**Sector 7** by David Wiesner, c1999 (IL: K-3)

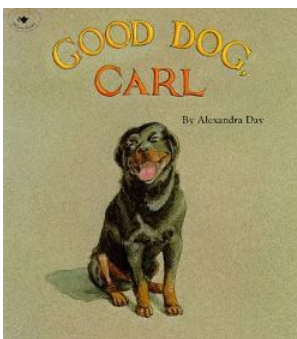
**Freefall** by David Wiesner, c1988 (IL: K-3)

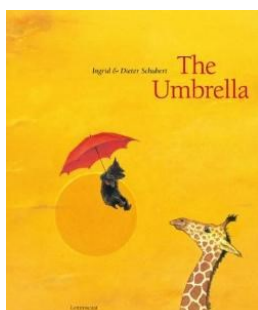
**Anno's Journey** by Mitsumasa Anno, c1977 (IL: K-3)

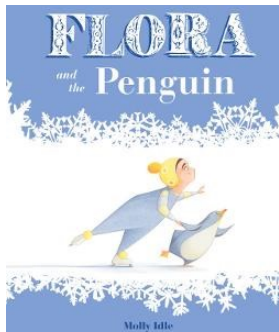


**The Umbrella** by Ingrid Schubert, c2010 (IL: K-3)

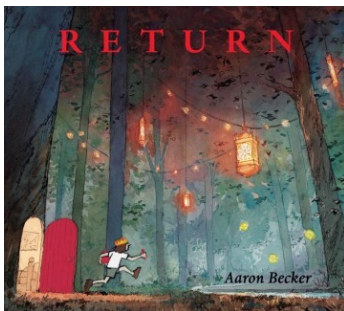
## Unspoken: A Story from the Underground Railroad by Henry Cole, c2012 (IL: K-3)

"A young Southern farm girl discovers a runaway slave hiding behind the corn crib in the barn and decides to help him." - Follett



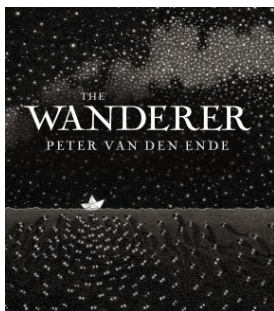
## The Middle Passage: White Ships/Black Cargo by Tom Feelings, c2018 (IL: YA)

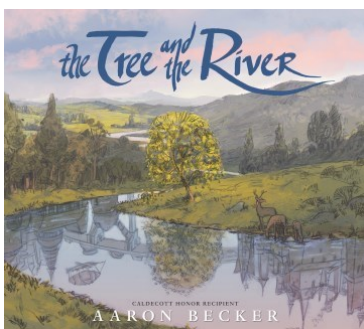
## Return by Aaron Becker, c2016 (IL: K-3)

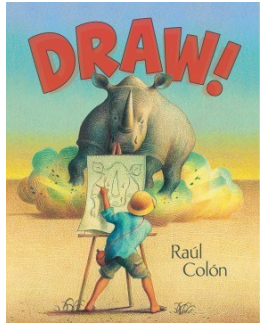
## The Tree and the River by Aaron Becker, c2023 (IL: 1-5, RL: ?)

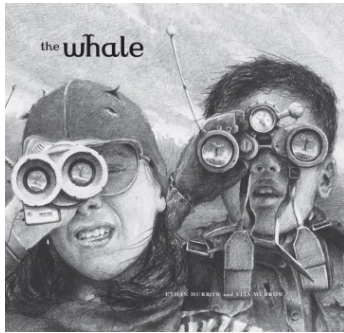
