Core Word Focus: LOOK

Our next core word focus is *look;* this word directs others and shares the speaker's attention to something with the listener. It is an important word for sharing experiences. Look can be used throughout the day in all environments. You can exaggerate the meaning by using a sweeping point towards the thing or person. When directing their attention, use look with items the child tends to be interested in rather than things they may not care much about. You can also use it when the child has already noticed and is paying attention to something—a noisy plane overhead, a big truck driving by, a bead they dropped and are going to get, and so on. This demonstrates to them how they could say look to direct your attention to something they are interested in. Searching, or looking, is a powerful problem-solving tool.

When a child wants something—whether we know what the thing is or not—we can help them learn to solve the problem by **looking** for it. It's important to demonstrate **looking** for something before there is a desperate search for an item that is particularly important to them. Let them experience what **looking** for something means when they don't have much at stake. Then when this strategy is really, really needed, they will be more likely to understand what is happening and feel supported and hopeful. It can also be a good idea to help others to **look** for things, to **look** for things on a list, etc. (see activity suggestions below) prior to the need for **looking** as a problem-solving tool.
